Pastor's Blog,

Last weekend, I was ashamed of something that was really out of our control. We taped our Sunday liturgy early in the week to allow for video processing, so I was mortified that there was no mention of or prayers on behalf of George Floyd and the horrific aftermath that continues to unfold. I was overwhelmed by the desire to address this and worked on a video that we recently posted online. I realized, however, that I needed to reach out personally and sent an e-mail to Rev. Dr. Gloria Jimpson, pastor of Payne AME Church in Chatham, to express my support for her and the community. This was meant to be a personal message, but her powerful response encouraged us both to be public with our exchange as one way of demonstrating unity and to bring a sense of healing. Pastor Gloria and I work closely not only in our

ecumenical Christian joint efforts but also as proud members of the interfaith community, which is part of the Chatham Area Interfaith Council (CAIC). This continues the tradition of the Center for Faith Enrichment (CFE). I spoke on behalf of the parishioners of St. James because our communities have worked and worshiped so closely together, but I know that I speak for the members of all our churches. God bless you all, and as you grapple with these issues, know that your pastors and faith leaders are as well. Together, in prayer and action, we can unite in God's justice, mercy, and love.

The response of two more pastors:

Bishop Edward B. Scharfenberger has written a column addressing the killing of George Floyd, the subsequent violence in our country, and America's "original sin" of racism. The column is posted in its entirety on the website of *The Evangelist* and will be in print on Thursday as well.

Here are excerpts from the Bishop's column:

"Scratch the surface and we see that racism and its vestiges persist." America's "original sin," as it has been called, must be not only acknowledged but vigorously resisted and corrected. Yes, the use of excessive force by some police is intolerable and must be addressed, especially as, racially and ethnically, it is systemically applied

- "... In the current crisis, however, the manner of response of public officials cannot be dismissed as an insignificant factor. Was there ever any doubt about what we all saw in that viral video? Then why did it take so long to remove the offending officers and finally place one under arrest? Recall that, before the violence escalated, protestors were simply demanding justice, for the most part, peacefully. Why did it take five days to respond? Why this and similar delays in other cases with apprehension of law officials acting violently against someone offering no resistance?
- "... Justice delayed is justice denied. In this, everyone must play a part. If history teaches us anything, it is that the man with his head held to the ground could have been you or your brother. Where the police power of the State is not subject to restraint and the rule of equal treatment under the law, that man, black or white, could be you or me, Christian, Muslim or Jew. In pursuit of justice, all must ante up."

Dear Gloria,

The murder of George Floyd and the horrific aftermath has affected us all, and I want you to know that so many of the parishioners of St. James have immediately thought of the members of Payne AME and how difficult this must be, especially without the ability to come together in positive action, consolation, and prayer.

While trying to compose something the other night, I had a bit of a meltdown. I was overwhelmed by the images I saw as I tried to put into words the horror of the situation.

As pastor to your amazing congregation, I can't imagine what you are feeling or going through. I know you have the support of Iris and others, but this must be an exceptionally difficult time. Please know of my support and prayers personally and of our community.

Several people in our extended Interfaith community, led by Nick Biggs and others, have called for the showing of public support and would like to help in any way possible. In the future, perhaps we could continue a dialogue centered in prayer and respect. I think it's best for us not to move forward with an agenda but to hear from you and the community first and respond to your needs at this time.

Please forward my words to anyone else within the church. I really do want you to know that you are all in my thoughts and prayers.
